INTRODUCTION



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Sports Legacy Fund Annual Report - 2025

Welcome to the 16th edition of the Sports Legacy Fund Annual Report to

the community and 17th allocation summary since the first Fund grants in 2009. The Board of Directors and members of the Sports Legacy Fund are pleased to report the allocation of the 2025 grants.

Since 2009 and with the completion of the 2025 fiscal year, \$5.8 million will have been invested in 134 of the Kamloops and Region sport organizations. The Fund is unique to Kamloops and is envisioned to operate to perpetuity by way of a diverse managed investment portfolio.

The Fund originated from the \$6.1 million sale of the Kamloops Blazers Hockey Club franchise in 2007 and a \$1.4 million contribution at the dissolution of the Blazers Foundation in 2008.

The Society has dedicated the Sports Legacy Fund to the recognition of the community support for the franchise since its inaugural season in 1984.

It is recognized that the Sports Legacy Fund is a community resource, and the

reporting commits to the transparency of the allocation process.

The Annual Report represents the evaluation and confirmation that the grants have been appropriately directed, contributing to the improving capacities of the recipient organizations.

Grant applications will be accepted from September 1st to October 31st of each year and reviewed to evaluate the eligibility of the requests, following which an allocation process is used to determine the direction of funding for the following year.

Follow up Community Impact Reports are submitted by the recipients in the December following the receipt of the funds and form the source of information for the Annual Report. The reports are paraphrased for the purpose of the edition.

GRANT IMPACTS 2024

The 2025 allocation of \$494,503 is directed to 29 sport organizations. This year, 25 organizations were selected from the applicants' stream to receive grants totaling \$233,503. This ranges from \$2,000 for the Kamloops Tsunami Summer Swim Club to \$25,000 funding for the Kamloops Broncos Football Team to replace team uniforms.

The 2025 allocations are fully listed within this report and include grants for capital projects, equipment purchases, uniforms, and coaching development. The contributions include a grant of \$20,000 to the Kamloops Canoe and Kayak Club to purchase a safety boat replacement, a number of contributing grants for projects including Kamloops Beach Volleyball Club for a court cooling irrigation system at a cost of \$19,983 and \$20,00 for the Nicola Valley Rodeo Association to assist in the replacement of the stall infrastructure.

Equipment continues to be the most predominant request of the applicants. Representative of these grants is funding of \$11,942 for the Kamloops Waterski Club to purchase specialized meet cameras, \$16,570 for the Kamloops Track and Field Club to buy priority equipment and \$12,750 for Kamloops Triathlon Club to contribute to the purchase of a storage event and travel trailer.

Coaching development remains a key to organizational capacities and supported by grants of \$7,500 to Adaptive Sports at Sun Peaks, \$5,000 to Kamloops Minor Hockey Association and \$65,000 of the PacificSport Interior BC grant.

In 2023, a grant from the Capital Project Reserve Fund for \$375,000 was awarded to equip the TRU Wolfpack High-Performance Training Centre. The 2025 payment of \$75,000 represents the third annual of five yearly contributions. The Kamloops Youth Soccer Association received a grant of \$120,000 in 2024 to contribute to the restoration of the Soccer Dome and will receive \$40,000 in 2025 as the second year of three annual payments.

Board initiatives are not part of the application process. Support for TRU athletic scholarships remain at \$25,000, which will be matched by the university. The initiatives include funding for the Kamloops KidSport Chapter of \$40,000, PacificSport Interior BC for \$80,000 and Kamloops Blazers Academic Awards at \$1,200.

There are three funding streams: Application Process, Board Initiatives and Capital Projects Reserve Fund (see chart).

The 2024 grants were provided to 31 Kamloops and Region sport organizations for a total allocation of \$458,460. The funds are strategically aligned with the recipient organization's goals to utilize the grants to strengthen capacity and maximize the benefit, whether purchasing equipment and uniforms, completing a capital project, or developing coaching skills. The funding is leveraged whenever possible to maximize the returns.

Annually measuring the impacts of the funding and revisiting the groups receiving them is a vital component of the governance and oversight of the Sports Legacy Fund.

The review provides a process to evaluate the grants and determine if the funds continue to be well invested and meet the expectations envisioned by the Sports Legacy Fund vision, mission, and guiding principles.

The community impacts are reflections by the organizations based on the funding impacts for 2024. The report is a summary compiled and paraphrased from these responses.

ADAPTIVE SPORTS AT SUN PEAKS (ASSP)

Formed in 2008 as a volunteer-based society, ASSP addressed the need for inclusive programming in local learn-to-ski programs within the school board's physical education curriculum. Founder Dick Taylor envisioned "no children be left behind." For over 16 years, ASSP has removed barriers to sport and recreation for people with disabilities/neurodiversity at Sun Peaks and TNRD.

The vision is to adapt the mountain playground for equal access to lakes, forests, and mountains. They raise funds for specialist adaptive equipment and recruit/ train volunteers to deliver multi-sports programs tailored to participants' needs.

Currently, ASSP offers options for people with disabilities aged 6+:

· Learn to ski/snowboard/sit ski

with adaptations for amputees, spinal cord injuries, sight/hearing impairment, intellectual/cognitive disabilities, spectral disorder, PTSD.

• Summer experiences for individuals with neuro-divergent challenges.

• Adaptive mountain biking for teens/ adults with physical disabilities/neurodivergent challenges.

• School program supporting inclusion of students with disabilities in school-sponsored programs.

ASSP has an internationally recognized snow sport training program with three in-house Canadian Adaptive Snowsports (CADS) Level 3 Course Conductors capable of training instructors to CADS Level 1/2 specialty certification programs. This allows training volunteer instructors throughout winter without external course conductors. The training committee maintains high

professionalism standards sought by international ski instructor groups. The 2024 Sports Legacy Fund grant of \$5,000 supports training programs.

BOOOGIE THE BRIDGE SOCIETY

As the largest community and charitable fun run within Kamloops and TNRD, it has been a goal for the team to have a Boogie the Bridge branded start/finish line arch for years.

Sadly, the financial impact of the 2020 pandemic delayed this goal.

The Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund grant of \$7,992 made this a reality, adding to the grassroots run's professionalism; from its humble beginnings of 62 participants to over 2,300 yearly.

Participants loved the new vibe and photo opportunities provided by the arch at the finish line.

KAMLOOPS AQUATICS CLUB (KAMLOOPS CLASSICS SWIM CLUB)

The club received a \$2,352 grant, allowing them to purchase 6 stopwatches and 2 laptops to support excellence in aquatic sports and foster a positive, inclusive environment. The laptops have enhanced communication within the swim community, resulting in growing entry levels.

The stopwatches enable coaches to track swimmer performance with measurable metrics, identifying areas for development. These metrics include times, stroke rates, and splits to determine pacing and track performance from meet to meet/cycle to cycle/season to season. These tools have contributed to adaptive training development and increased provincial qualifiers (from 9 last year to 19 this year). Exceptional meet performance of athletes is largely owed to the stopwatches.

KAMLOOPS BADMINTON ASSOCIATION

The \$700 grant enabled the Kamloops Badminton Association to buy 25 tubes of feathered shuttles for practice and gameplay. The KBA had a successful 2024 season; highlights included:

• Over 100 players attended Tuesday/ Thursday sessions.

• Partnered with the City of Kamloops for family sessions in Spring and Fall.

• Added a summer session at Sa-Hali Secondary for members and drop-in players.

• Hosted the Kamloops Open in Fall,

with players from Kamloops and Kelowna.

The KBA plans to return to Pacific Way Elementary in Fall 2025, after relocating to Parkcrest Elementary this year. They will offer family sessions with the city again and look forward to working with the new Kamloops Shuttlers Club to provide multiple levels of competition and grow the sport.

KAMLOOPS BIATHLON CLUB

The \$5,500 grant supported NCCP instruction, officials coaching, and biathlon demonstrations. They tracked 739 participants in multiple biathlon demonstrations and camps in 2024. They also partnered with Biathlon BC, PacificSport Interior, Spirit North, and Overlander Ski Club while running their own try-it activities.

The club developed a structured partnership with Overlander Ski Club to incorporate biathlon training into their youth ski programming. Over 20 kids will do electronic biathlon this winter at Stake Lake. This is in addition to their own club programming at West Highlands Community Centre and Kamloops Target Shooting Association. This season focuses on building the partnership with Overlander, increasing the number of kids involved in biathlon and Nordic skiing, and expanding offerings to adults.

KAMLOOPS BIKE RIDERS' ASSOCIATION

The Kamloops Bike Riders' Association (KBRA) received \$18,118 funding for a bicycle trailer to transport bicycles to trailheads, supporting the Outride program at several School District 73 (SD73) schools and other activities benefiting underprivileged youth in Kamloops.

The Outride Program offers ~30 quality specialized brand mountain bikes to qualified schools. Schools with higher numbers of female riders, at-risk youth, and/or Indigenous populations are targeted as they typically lack access to this sport. Kamloops is fortunate that 5 SD73 schools received this grant, highlighting the potential growth seen by the Outride Program in Kamloops, unmatched by any other School District in North America.

SD73 schools with grants maintain the bikes and use them to teach kids cycling fundamentals and trail riding. Despite this opportunity, these 5 schools face a roadblock in transporting bicycles from school to trails.

KAMLOOPS COLLEGIATE BASEBALL SOCIETY (TRU WOLFPACK)

The 2024 grant of \$5,500 was used to shore-up their aging indoor training facility. This included: a minor retrofit of the pitching machine, turf to protect the floor, and cage netting & screens for safety. These additions make it a functional facility. The support allows the program to keep team

fees manageable. Additionally, the funding enables the coaching staff to attract student athletes from Kamloops, other regions in BC, and across Western Canada.

KAMLOOPS DISC GOLF CLUB

The Kamloops Disc Golf Club (KDGC) received \$5,500 for rejuvenation and improvement of local disc golf courses maintained by the club. The club is run by a strong volunteer board passionate about disc golf and the community. Additional disc golf baskets were purchased to replace aging equipment.

Disc golf is an extremely accessible sport, with Kamloops providing 4-disc golf courses to the public free of charge. Over 15,000 rounds were logged online in 2024 between these 4 courses, with tens of thousands more played by recreational players. The Kamloops courses are spread throughout the city and

include established tournament courses Rose Hill Disc Golf Course and McArthur Island Disc Golf Course, beginner-friendly Westsyde Disc Golf Course, and newly developed Dick Hart Disc Golf Course used for high-level competition.

Community engagement is important to KDGC, with members teaching over 30 clinics and sharing disc golf with over 500 people.

Regular activities include a weekly handicap league, ladies night, and doubles play supported by long-time and new members. 14 tournaments were held on courses maintained by the club, providing competition avenues for local players and an economic boost from players travelling to the region. Grants like this allow the club to continue providing quality courses and experiences for an ever-increasing number of disc golf players in Kamloops.



KAMLOOPS DRAGON BOAT CLUB

The fleet has been aging and requiring costly repairs for many years. The \$13,296 grant was used to purchase a new dragon boat for the club. This contribution has had a significant impact, advancing the mission and enhancing the experience for all paddlers in our community. The grant will help achieve:

• Boost Team Morale: Long-time paddlers, who have eagerly awaited this moment, are now uplifted and re-energized by the progress made possible through the support.

• Improved Health and Longevity: The proper build and design of the new boat will enhance the physical well-being and longevity of existing paddlers, allowing them to continue enjoying the sport safely and effectively.

• Enhanced Safety: The stability of the new boat will significantly increase safety for all participants, ensuring a more secure and enjoyable paddling experience.

• Increased Membership Potential: With the addition of the new boat, they are optimistic about attracting new members to the organization and introducing more individuals to the sport they love.

• Growing the Fleet and Community Impact: Expanding the fleet not only fosters greater membership but also encourages participation in local festivals, boosting signups and contributing to KDBC's financial health while supporting Kamloops' broader community revenue.

KAMLOOPS INTERIOR DRAGON BOAT SOCIETY

The 2024 grant of \$7,500 awarded to the Kamloops Interior Dragons Boat Society ("KIDS") was used to purchase various styles of jerseys and jackets. KIDS is a dragon boat club with members aged 55+ and from 2025, members aged 50+.

They have had many successes, such as winning gold at the 2022 Canada 55+ Summer Games in Kamloops. The club is very pleased with the purchase, as this attire performs well when practicing and competing. The clothing also enhances the team's appearance when attending outof-town festivals, representing the City of Kamloops.

KAMLOOPS MINOR HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

The Kamloops Minor Hockey Association thrives on the dedication of nearly 500 volunteers who selflessly give their time to support young athletes' development. These volunteers are the backbone of the organization, fostering teamwork, skill development, and a love of the game. The 2024 grant of \$5,000 is vital in reimbursing volunteer certification costs. The funding ensures that volunteers are equipped with necessary training and resources to create a safe, inclusive, and high-quality hockey experience for all participants, strengthening hockey's foundation in Kamloops.

KAMLOOPS MINOR LACROSSE ASSOCIATION

The \$9,157 in funding strengthened

the Kamloops Minor Lacrosse Association (KMLA) and its mission to provide a safe, engaging, and professional environment for youth players. The purchase of essential equipment addressed critical needs, enhancing player safety and program quality.

One significant investment was replacing worn goalie equipment for box lacrosse. Goalies are the backbone of any team but are difficult to recruit and retain due to physical demands. Equipping goalies with two complete sets of high-quality Cat 3 lacrosse equipment prioritized their safety and comfort, significantly improving their field experience. This investment mitigates injury risks and fosters confidence, encouraging young athletes to remain active KMLA members. Protecting goalies effectively is a direct investment in long-term team and association sustainability.

Additionally, the funding allowed them to

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replace four aging field lacrosse nets, which had become unreliable due to wear and frequent repairs.

These new nets are vital for hosting multiple game days, bringing together players of all ages for exciting matchups. The upgraded equipment ensures high-quality facilities, aligning with lacrosse's increasing visibility, especially with Lacrosse Sixes being accepted into the 2028 Olympics. These nets also enable them to expand programming and encourage greater community participation in the sport.

KAMLOOPS RATTLERS SENIOR LACROSSE CLUB

The \$5,000 grant, coupled with the 2023 helmet and glove reserve fund, was used to purchase new helmets, cages, and gloves for the 2024 season. The club bought 30 pairs of Warrior EVO Lacrosse Gloves, 30 Warrior Alpha Pro Helmets, and 30 Warrior FB Facemask 2.0. This complete team set of matching equipment replaced the old, mismatched sets, something they hadn't provided since 2010.

Player safety, especially head and hand safety, is crucial in a contact sport like lacrosse. With Pro grade helmets and gloves, they provided the best protection against injuries. Besides better safety, the new equipment helped the team look and feel more unified on the floor. It also aided in player recruitment and retention this past season.

KAMLOOPS RUGBY CLUB

The \$7,585 grant was used to buy new training equipment, supplementing existing inventory and replacing unusable items. They purchased: 50 training balls for senior teams, 60 for mini rugby, 40 pinnies, 4 contact wedges, 4 tackle shields, and 200 training marker cones.

Proper and sufficient equipment leads to more effective training sessions and better field results. Club participation and player registration are at an all-time high, and the future looks great!

• The Senior Men's Division 2 team is leading the standings after the fall season with a 9-0 record.

• The Senior Women's team moved from 2nd to 1st Division this fall and is currently in 4th place. They will go to England in August next year to watch the Women's World Cup. Canada's Women's team is ranked 3rd in the world, so fans are hoping for a strong showing.

• The Junior Boys teams (U19, U17, and U15) all qualified for playoffs this fall. The U19 Boys squad will travel to Argentina in March 2025 for a two-week tour. Argentina's Rugby Program is one of the best, with their Men's National Team ranked 5th in World Rugby standings.

• The Junior Girls program has a new coach and is seeing an increase in registered players.

• The Mini Rugby program continues to see 100+ kids aged 4 to 12 attending spring and fall sessions.

KAMLOOPS SPIRIT WARRIORS SOCIETY

The \$10,000 grant was used to purchase a new Millennial dragon boat. Since the society's founding in 2008, they have rented boats from the Kamloops Dragon Boat Club, but these are old and need replacement. Members agreed to pursue a safer, lighter boat. The Millennial is best suited for river paddling, being very stable, especially in high water situations.

Additionally, it is used in most Dragonboat festivals throughout the province. Having their own boat for practice provides a better training ground and a safer option for members with health issues.

KAMLOOPS SPORTS COUNCIL

The Council received a \$23,146 grant to improve infrastructure at the Shumway Lake site, home to the Kamloops Canoe and Kayak Club (KCKC), Kamloops Rowing Club (KRC), and Kamloops Waterski Club (KWS). It is an integral part of the City of Kamloops Tournament Capital venues but requires independent funding as it is outside city limits. The facilities are managed by the KSC and significantly funded by the Legacy Fund when administered by the Kamloopa Club. The total invested in the site to date is \$97,560, excluding direct club grants.

The 2024 improvements supported by the grant:

• Kamloops Water Ski Club repair of the aging ski jump.

• Additional set of polyethylene dock.

• 40-foot storage container for the

Kamloops Canoe and Kayak Club.

KAMLOOPS SUNRAYS ARTISTIC SWIM CLUB

The \$2,969 grant was used to purchase an underwater camera, iPad, and flippers for each athlete. With the GoPro and iPad, they can video swimmers underwater to see their sculling and body position. They can analyze the video and self-correct. This helps them grow as athletes and allows coaches to continue developing strong athletes.

They use the flippers to build strong kicking and focus on different parts of their strokes. They also enjoy going upside down and being silly with the flippers on their feet, unknowingly working on their skills at the same time.

KAMLOOPS THERAPEUTIC RIDING ASSOCIATION

The \$3,000 grant funded a new mounting ramp for riders, improving accessibility, safety, and efficiency of therapeutic riding sessions.

Impact Highlights:

• Enhanced Accessibility: The new ramp ensures all riders, including those with mobility challenges, can mount their horses safely and with dignity, making programs more inclusive.

• Improved Safety: Designed with updated safety standards, the ramp reduces physical strain on riders and staff, minimizing injury risks during mounting and dismounting.

• Program Efficiency: The ramp streamlines lesson transitions, maximizing riding time for each participant while ensuring individualized support.

Since its completion, the ramp has been used by over 153 riders of all ages and abilities. Its impact extends to their families and caregivers, who have expressed relief and gratitude for the improved infrastructure. This grant has been transformative for the organization, helping them provide a higher quality of service to the community.

KAMLOOPS TRACK AND FIELD CLUB

The Kamloops Track and Field Club must keep updated in the photo finish department

as technology changes. The \$11,665 grant provided them the Etherlynx High Sensitivity Color Camera with the timer enabling option. The vision cameras with high resolution enable officials to see who exactly has crossed the finish line and in what order and time. The camera was used for the following meets:

• Gary Reed Invitational Feb 2024

• Van Ryswyk Masters Championships March 2024

• Dylan Armstrong Track Classic (BC Summer Games Qualifier) May 2024

• Northwest Zone Secondary School Meet May 2024

- Okanagan Championships May 2024

- SD #73 District Meet May 2024

• BC Interior Elementary Championships - June 2024

KTFC uses this camera for all indoor and outdoor meets for club, elementary, and secondary school meets. The impact on the meets is having correct and live results. There is also a profitable benefit of the camera use from all club meets. Elementary and high school students know they have the best equipment and can count on the results being accurate.

KAMLOOPS TRIATHLON CLUB

The Kamloops Triathlon Club grant of \$9,521 was used to purchase 10 smart bike trainers. Initially requesting funding for 8 trainers, the club supplemented the grant with its own resources, allowing for the acquisition of two additional trainers.

This investment has significantly enhanced the capacity to provide year-round training opportunities for athletes of all skill levels.

Over the past year, the smart trainers have been instrumental in hosting group training sessions, ensuring continuity during poor outdoor air quality conditions caused by wildfires. These trainers have also encouraged participation by demonstrating how triathlon can be an accessible, yearround sport.

The pinnacle of the trainers' impact was the Kamloops Indoor Triathlon, hosted at the Tournament Capital Center on January 12, 2025. This event drew over 60 athletes who competed in a challenging yet exhilarating format:

• 300m Swim: Participants swam in the indoor pool.

• 10km Bike: Racers competed virtually using the smart trainers, engaging in a dynamic and interactive cycling experience.

• 2km Run: The event concluded with a spirited run on the indoor track.

The event showcased the potential of indoor training technologies and attracted athletes and spectators from across the region. It highlighted how innovation and strategic investments can foster community involvement in sports.

Impact Summary:

• Enhanced year-round training opportunities for local athletes.

• Expanded participation in triathlon, fostering community wellness.

• Mitigated challenges posed by environmental conditions like wildfire smoke.

• Promoted Kamloops as a hub for innovative and inclusive sports events.

KAMLOOPS TSUNAMI SUMMER SWIM CLUB

With the \$3,918 in funding, the club purchased:

• An updated Kamloops Tsunami Summer Swim Club record board for display at the Brocklehurst pool.

• 20 Swimmer of the Week medals to acknowledge exceptional swimmers each week in each of the two skill groups.

• Two new pop-up team tents for visibility and coverage at swim meets.

• 50 Tsunami team t-shirts to showcase athletes at swim meets.

• Two split interval stopwatches

for coaches to time multiple swimmers simultaneously.

• A portable digital pace clock used at every practice.

• A new BBQ grill for the annual BBQ and potluck at the season completion/awards night.

These items are essential for maintaining high-level training and coaching for the competitive summer swim team in Kamloops. This equipment enables Tsunami to remain competitive within the Okanagan Region and at the British Columbia Summer Swimming Association (BCSSA) Provincial Championships, where they sent many swimmers in 2024 to Vancouver at UBC.

KAMLOOPS VOLLEYBALL ASSOCIATION

The Kamloops Volleyball Association received a grant of \$15,476 for volleyball

equipment. Most of the grant went to purchasing new volleyballs for various programs, from 10-year-olds to 50+ adults. They also purchased equipment to increase safety in practices and help athletes reach team and individual goals.

These included ball carts for coaches, new antennas for school gyms, targets for setters and passers to work on accuracy, tripods for video feedback, and a radar gun. The radar gun is a fun tool for athletes to see how hard they can hit or serve a ball, and velocity is a key metric for provincial teams and universities. Now athletes can track their speed as they develop serving and spiking skills.

KAMLOOPS YOUTH SOCCER ASSOCIATION

KYSA undertook the major restoration of the Soccer Dome in the summer and fall of 2024. The upgrade was supported by a 5-year interest-free loan from the City of Kamloops and a \$120,000 commitment from the Fund to invest \$40,000 per year through 2027.

The restoration has allowed the association to operate at capacity during the

winter months and provide alternate options during heat spells and smoky conditions the rest of the year. The 20-year-old facility was becoming unusable, and Kamloops and the region currently lack an indoor site for training and multiuse activities. This investment has a significant impact on the sporting community and will complement future field house development envisioned within the Build Kamloops project. The project funding was sourced from the Capital Project Reserve Fund.

KIDSPORT KAMLOOPS CHAPTER

KidSport Kamloops is a local chapter of KidSport Canada. They are a not-for-profit organization that removes financial barriers preventing children from playing sports. Funds raised locally are spent locally and distributed as grants to cover registration and/or equipment fees for a season of sport. Sport and physical activity provide invaluable opportunities for kids to learn teamwork, fair play, and dedication.

Through sport participation, kids learn to set goals and work to achieve them — all while having fun and learning social and fundamental movement skills. Kids in sport

benefit from increased self-confidence and tend to lead happier, healthier lifestyles, now and in the future.

The chapter accepts applications and administers grants of up to \$625 per child/year for kids who live in Kamloops or other communities they serve. The year 2024 was most successful, with 391 kids receiving \$163,000 in support. The downside of this outcome is a significant demand for the fundraising capacity of the local group.

The grant of \$40,000 contributed to the program, but the community is also encouraged to step up and help. More information about the chapter's operation and donations is available at www.kidsport. ca/kamloops.

McARTHUR ISLAND CURLING CLUB

Their grant of \$5,100 allowed the club to purchase all the paint needed for the 2024 ice installation and have the scraper and nipper blades shipped and sharpened. The club also purchased helmets and grippers for the Learn to Curl participants to keep them safe on the ice. Over the years, these contributions have been tremendously helpful to both the club and curling in Kamloops. This is the last year of operation for the club, and all assets will be transferred to the Kamloops Curling Club.

PACIFICSPORT INTERIOR BC

PacificSport Interior BC is a Regional Sport Centre that educates, inspires, and engages communities in the sport pathway. The not-for-profit Society is connected to a network of five PacificSport Centres, three National campuses (Canadian Sport Institute), and the Regional Alliance across the province. The PacificSport Centres are a network of not-for-profit organizations committed to enriching lives and energizing communities via sport, physical activity, and physical literacy across BC.

A legacy of the 1993 Canada Summer Games hosted in Kamloops, PacificSport Interior BC is a regional sport hub created to lead athlete, coach, and community sport services as far north as 100 Mile House; northeast to Sun Peaks, Barriere, and Clearwater; east to Golden, Revelstoke, Salmon Arm, and Sicamous; and southwest to Lytton. In partnership with the viaSport Regional Alliance, PacificSport Interior BC aims to increase awareness, opportunity, and participation in physical activity and sport – from playground to podium – while enhancing access to coaching and athlete programs.

The \$80,000 allocation of funding reflects

a long-standing community partnership and relationship which impacts local sport organizations exponentially. This represents \$65,000 directly going to the Local Sport Organizations, matched dollar for dollar for a paid certified coach. Additionally, PacificSport receives \$5,000 for Coach Ancillary Support, which supports these coaches with professional development opportunities so they can be the best they can be. The coaches can access this funding to attend the National Championships with their athletes as well. Lastly, PacificSport receives \$10,000 for athletes who have qualified for National Championships in their respective sports for travel support.

TRU WOLFPACK ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIPS

The Legacy Fund annually provides scholarships of \$25,000 for the TRU Athletics Program. These funds are fully matched by the university and Kamloops athletes primarily benefit within the program. The recipients for the scholastic year 2024-2025: (see chart on page 21)

TRU WOLFPACK HIGH-PERFORMANCE TRAINING CENTRE

The \$75,000 grant in 2023 was the first major community legacy for the Legacy Fund. The 5-year annual \$75,000 commitment to equip the centre has been drawn from The Society Capital Project Reserve Fund and has already significantly impacted the athletes' training programs. The facility was officially dedicated and opened on October 25, 2023.

TWIN RIVERS STRENGTH SPORTS ASSOCIATION

The Twin Rivers Strength Sports Association received \$7,617 to buy Strongman and Powerlifting equipment. They acquired Strongarm competition plates, a combo rack, competition collars, a Titex power bar, Bells of Steel Sandbags, and Resolute Axle Bars and Steel Logs.

With this equipment, they hosted the inaugural Twin Rivers Strengthfest, featuring sanctioned competitions for Special Olympics BC Powerlifters, BCPA Powerlifting, and the BC Strongman/ Strongwoman Corporation. Over 160 athletes, 100 volunteers, and 1,000 spectators participated, receiving overwhelmingly positive feedback.

Using the Sports Legacy Funds' equipment, the association hosted a Novice Strongman/Strongwoman competition and a philanthropy event, 'Reps for Vets,' raising nearly \$3,000 for veterans at Honor Ranch. They are planning a Novice Powerlifting competition, assisting in a High School Powerlifting Competition, and organizing the 2nd Annual Strengthfest to further develop Strength Sports in the Interior.
