Kamloops Centre for the Arts

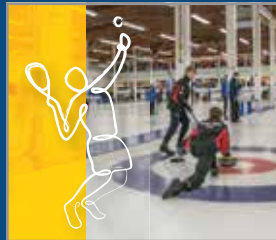
Current Status: Construction

The Kamloops Centre for the Arts will be an iconic structure that elevates our city's overall cultural vibrancy and serves as a cornerstone for economic growth. Located at 393 Seymour Street, it will be Kamloops' first new theatre since 1978.

Arena Multiplex

Current Status: Validation-Design

The Arena Multiplex will be built at 2070 Hillside Drive, adding four new rinks to expand capacity for more than 100 local clubs and strengthen event-hosting capabilities. More details on the final design and budget are expected this summer!



Curling and Racquet Sports Complex

Current Status: Planning

This project will redevelop the 700 block of Victoria Street into a vibrant hub for curling, racquet sports, and community amenities. With construction still years away, user and community engagement will shape the project's vision and design.

KAMLOOPS SPORTS legacyfund

The Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund is a perpetual, community-based endowment established from the \$6.1 million 2007 sale of the Kamloops Blazers Hockey Club and a \$1.4 million contribution from the dissolution of the Blazers Foundation, designed to reinvest proceeds into local sport organizations across Kamloops and the surrounding region.

Since beginning grant allocations in 2009, the Fund has allocated over \$6.1 million to 134 organizations, supporting equipment purchases, capital projects, coaching development, athlete scholarships, and accessibility initiatives that strengthen organizational capacity and expand participation opportunities.

In 2025 alone, \$473,081 was directed to 29 organizations through application grants, board initiatives, and capital reserve projects, benefiting programs such as KidSport, PacificSport Interior BC, TRU athletics, adaptive and inclusive sports, youth development, and facility improvements, demonstrating measurable impacts including increased participation, improved safety, enhanced training environments, and broader access to sport for children, families, and underserved populations

Welcome to the 17th edition of the Sports Legacy Fund Annual Report to the community and 18th allocation summary since the first Fund grants in 2009.

The Board of Directors and members of the Sports Legacy Fund are pleased to

report the allocation of the 2026 grants and narratives provided by the 2025 recipients.

The Fund is unique to Kamloops and is envisioned to operate to perpetuity by way of a diverse managed investment portfolio.

It is recognized that the Sports Legacy Fund is a community resource, and the reporting commits to the transparency of the allocation process.

The Annual Report represents the evaluation and confirmation that the grants have been appropriately directed, contributing to the improving capacities of the recipient organizations.

Grant applications are accepted from September 1st to October 31st of each year and reviewed to evaluate the eligibility of the requests, following which an allocation process is used to determine the direction of funding for the following year.

Follow up Community Impact Reports are submitted by the recipients in the December following the receipt of the funds and form the source of information for the Annual Report.

The reports are summarized for the purpose of the edition. The process and an oversight of the Sports Legacy Fund governance structure may be reviewed by accessing the website at kamloopssportslegacyfund.com.

GRANT RECIPIENT HIGHLIGHTS 2026

Grant allocations are based on three funding streams: Application Process, Board Initiatives, Capital Projects Reserve Fund (see chart on page 12).

The 2026 allocation of \$513,586 is directed to 37 sport organizations.

This year, 32 organizations were selected from the applicants stream to receive grants totaling \$252,386.

This ranges from \$900 for the Kamloops Badminton Club to \$25,000 funding for the Kamloops Mountain Bike Trail Association to contribute to the lighting project on the All-Wheels Pump Track at the Kamloops Bike Ranch.

The 2026 allocations are fully listed and include application process grants for capital projects, equipment purchases, uniforms, and coaching development.

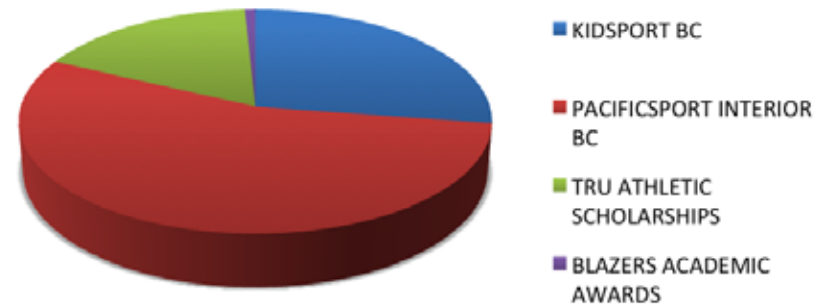
The contributions include a grant of \$20,000 to the Kamloops Long Blades

Club to purchase short-track safety mats for the McArthur Island facility.

There are a number of contributing grants for projects including the Greater Kamloops BMX Society for a permanent track sound system at a cost of \$10,000 and \$5,000 for the Kamloops Disc Golf Club upgrade to the Dick Hart Park for the disc sport participants.

Equipment continues to be the most predominant request of the applicants. Representative of these grants is funding of \$25,592 for the Kamloops 2026 55+ BC Games Society to purchase equipment for six event venues, \$3,000 for the Overlander Ski Club for snowshoes to support its SD 73 program. Track and Field Club received \$9,180 to buy priority equipment and \$11,500 for Sun Peaks Alpine Club to upgrade its timing system.

GRANT RECIPIENT HIGHLIGHTS 2026

Coaching development remains a key to organizational capacities and is supported by grants of \$6,000 to Adaptive Sports at Sun Peaks, \$5,000 to Kamloops Minor Hockey Association and \$65,000 of the PacificSport Interior BC grant from the Board Initiatives funding stream.

In 2023, a grant from the Capital Project Reserve Fund for \$375,000 was awarded to equip the TRU Wolfpack High-Performance Training Centre. The 2026 payment of \$75,000 represents the fourth annual of five yearly contributions. The Kamloops Youth Soccer Association received a grant of \$120,000 in 2024 to contribute to the restoration of the Soccer Dome and will receive \$40,000 in 2026 as the third year of three annual payments.

As noted, Board Initiatives are not part of the application process. Support for TRU athletic scholarships remain at \$25,000, which will be matched by the university. The initiatives include funding for the Kamloops KidSport Chapter of \$40,000, PacificSport Interior BC for \$80,000 and Kamloops Blazers Academic Awards at \$1,200.

GRANT IMPACTS 2025

The funds are strategically aligned with the recipient organization's goals to utilize the grants to strengthen capacity and maximize the benefit, whether purchasing equipment and uniforms, completing a capital project, or developing coaching skills.

The funding is leveraged whenever possible to maximize the returns. Annually measuring the impacts and revisiting the groups receiving them is a vital component of the governance and oversight of the Sports Legacy Fund.

The review provides a process to evaluate the grants and determine if the funds continue to be well invested and meet the expectations envisioned by the Sports Legacy Fund vision, mission, and guiding principles. The community impacts are reflections by the organizations based on the funding impacts for 2025.

The annual reports are a summary compiled from these paraphrased impact responses derived from the recipient submissions.

ADAPTIVE SPORTS AT SUN PEAKS (ASSP)

The vision is to adapt the mountain playground to enable equal access to the lakes, forests and mountains of this region. They raise funds to purchase and maintain specialist adaptive equipment and recruit and train volunteers to create and deliver multi-sports programs tailored to best meet the needs of the participants. The \$7,500 grant is a continuum of support for the training and certification of the volunteer base of adaptive instructors.

What makes up the ASSP Instructor Snowsport Training Program?

ASSP has an internationally recognized snow sport training program. We have

three in-house Canadian Adaptive Snowsports (CADS) Level 3 Course Conductors who are capable of training instructors to a CADS Level 1 and Level 2 specialty certification programs. The benefit to ASSP is an ability to train our volunteer instructors throughout the winter ski season and improve our lesson delivery capability without bringing in course conductors from other ski resorts. Our training committee holds a high standard of professionalism and is sought after by other international ski instructor groups.

What makes up the ASSP Adaptive Mountain Biking Instructor Training Program?

Now that we have our own Adaptive Mountain Bikes, ASSP will have the ability to host guest trainers to skill up our local



volunteers as certified adaptive mountain bike instructors. In May 2025, a group of volunteers traveled to Whistler to get certified in Adaptive Mountain biking.

ASSP now has its first three instructors with plans to host our own Adaptive Mountain biking course in the spring of 2026 with the intention of training six more adaptive mountain bike instructors.

Who are our volunteer ASSP snow sport instructors & summer experience volunteers?

ASSP delivers in house certification and ongoing professional development training for our growing pool of 60 winter volunteer instructors. As we increase the number of instructors, we are able to increase the number of lessons and students that we can serve.

We also host annual CADS Level 1 certification training programs for international organizations such as The Winter Sports Company and Snowminds as a form of fundraising.

Because our summer program is in its infancy, we are still developing our summer volunteer training program. As previously stated, we will begin to certify adaptive mountain bike instructors at Sun Peaks beginning next Spring.

BARRIERE RECREATION SOCIETY

We received \$13,957 to purchase rollout mesh sheets for our four ice sheets. These allowed the start up of our curling season to take place earlier, without having to repaint our cement floor each year. The floor gets a large amount of wear over the



summer from the different events held in the off season. Our society needs this rental income to maintain and operate the facility. Repainting the damaged floor takes a large number of volunteers to complete and delays putting ice down, so it has a chance to cure.



KAMLOOPS AQUATICS CLUB (KAMLOOPS CLASSICS SWIM CLUB)

The \$4,784 in funding enabled the purchase of two iPads, a GoPro camera, exercise mats, and a comprehensive selection of resistance bands, strengthening both our in-water and dryland training programs. These resources currently support 115 registered swimmers in our competitive program for the 2025/26 season and are also used by coaches to support instruction and training in other club programs when appropriate.

Coaches now use the iPads and GoPro to provide clear, visual feedback during training. Video review helps swimmers better understand technique, body

position, and movement in the water, supporting more effective learning and consistent skill development.

The exercise mats and resistance bands are used across multiple training groups as part of our structured dryland programming. This equipment supports strength development, mobility, and injury prevention, helping athletes train safely and build physical foundations that support long-term participation in the sport.

The equipment purchased through this grant has filled an important need within our club and continues to be used on an ongoing basis throughout the season.

It has improved the quality and consistency of our programming and strengthened the tools available to our coaches and athletes.

KAMLOOPS BEACH VOLLEYBALL CLUB

The Kamloops Beach Volleyball Club (KBVC) successfully completed the installation of an irrigation system at the Overlander Park Beach Volleyball Facility with \$17,882 in support. This capital infrastructure investment was undertaken to address extreme summer heat conditions that were increasingly impacting athlete safety, program continuity, and the usability of the courts during peak season.

The irrigation system consists of multiple dedicated irrigation valves providing full coverage across all beach volleyball courts. The system allows staff and volunteers to cool the sand surface selectively and efficiently during periods of high heat, improving safety and playability while ensuring responsible water use.

Over the past several summers, Kamloops has experienced prolonged heat events and extreme temperatures. When ambient air temperatures exceed 35°C, sand temperatures regularly surpass 40°C, creating unsafe playing conditions and resulting in cancelled leagues, tournaments, and training sessions.

Without this infrastructure upgrade, KBVC faced recurring program disruptions during peak summer months—precisely when demand for outdoor recreation is highest.

Comparable beach volleyball facilities in the Interior of British Columbia have adopted similar cooling infrastructure, and this project ensures Kamloops remains a safe, competitive, and viable host community for organized beach volleyball.

KAMLOOPS BIATHLON CLUB

The \$12,000 grant was used to purchase two EcoAim optical biathlon target

systems. A key outcome of this funding was the expansion of our partnership with Spirit North. Using the EcoAim systems, the club loans rifles and continues to deliver two weekly biathlon practices with Indigenous youth from three separate communities.

This consistent programming continues to provide a safe introduction to biathlon, reduces barriers to participation, and supports positive youth engagement while building a clear pathway into our broader club programs.

The EcoAim systems were also used extensively in sports camps and Overlander ski sessions, allowing both youth and adult participants to learn biathlon fundamentals before transitioning to .22 rifle training. During the 2025 season, youth and Masters athletes trained with EcoAims and progressed to compete in Biathlon BC Cup races, demonstrating a successful pathway from entry-level optical biathlon to competitive racing.

Overall, the EcoAim purchase strengthened our operational capacity, expanded community partnerships, increased participation across age groups, and supported athlete development from introductory programming through to competition.

KAMLOOPS BOWBENDERS

The Kamloops Bowbenders is an archery club which exists as part of the larger Kamloops Target Sports Association (KTSA) in Kamloops, with a membership exceeding 2500 members annually.

The club is well known within the National archery community for its annual spring 3D shoot which currently sits as the second largest shooting sports event in Canada. The club also provides weekly club shooting nights, including opportunity for instruction for new

members. In September of 2024, the Club suffered a substantial break-in resulting in the loss of most of their equipment used to provide training to beginners and new members.

As a result of an \$804 successful application, as well as donations of bows, arrows, and equipment from the greater archery community throughout BC, the club was re-invigorated.

The group decided that we would increase our involvement in the community. Six members completed Archery Canada training in March 2025 to become nationally certified coaches, and the club initiated a structured 2-week beginner course, and a 4-week juniors program.

The grant funds were used to provide additional bows to accommodate the variety in sizes and eye dominance of the junior archers attending the programs. Interestingly, young archers who started with our beginners program often sign up for our juniors program, and vice versa.

While exact numbers are not available at the time of drafting this report, a substantial number of the attendees of the beginner and junior programs have joined the club and are now attending club shooting nights.

Beginning in spring of 2026, a more intensive and longer-term juniors program is being initiated, based loosely on the Junior Olympians Program. This program will provide an avenue for junior shooters to advance their skills as well as a pathway to peer competition.

Program details are to be finalized but the expectation is that junior archers, aged 8-16 years of age, will be provided levels of achievement based on shooting scores at increasing distances and decreasing target sizes, reaching a competitive standing while shooting at World Archery targets

and standardized competitive distance of 18m.

We hope that the groundwork that has resulted directly from the support of the Kamloops Sport Legacy Fund will allow us to continue to grow the sport of archery in Kamloops and provide more variety of sport for young people within the community.

KAMLOOPS BRONCOS FOOTBALL TEAM

The \$25,000 grant was used to purchase new uniforms to replace those that were more than 10 years old. The previous uniforms were missing numbers, lacked appropriate size options to properly fit our players, and displayed outdated sponsors who no longer support the club.

As a result, the jerseys and pants were

no longer usable and did not represent a cohesive team on the field. In addition, players did not have consistent numbers for home and away games, which created confusion for both spectators and announcers.

With the support of the Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund, we were able to purchase two complete sets of jerseys and pants—one for home games and one for away games. We can now provide proper sizing for all players, ensuring comfort, safety, and a professional appearance.

Having proper uniforms significantly improves player morale and demonstrates to the community and the league that we are invested in the future of the Broncos organization.

We are proud of the continued growth of the club, with player registration

reaching one of its highest levels in many years. The 2026 season will also mark an exciting new chapter as we take the field with a new coaching staff, including a new head coach.

KAMLOOPS CANOE AND KAYAK CLUB

The Kamloops Canoe and Kayak Club (KCKC) is a community-based, registered non-profit society established in 1990. KCKC's mission is to offer high-quality paddling programming within a safe, fun, and supportive environment, enabling athletes of all ages and abilities to set and pursue goals – from recreational to internationally competitive.

The Kamloops Watersport Facility was constructed on the shores of Shumway Lake to provide a facility to host the 1993 Canada Games. It continues to be maintained by the Kamloops Sports Council with shared use by the Kamloops Roving Club, and the Kamloops Water Ski Club, and KCKC. Shumway Lake is one of two registered lakes in the province with a registered two-kilometre racecourse, sanctioned for both rowing and sprint canoe and kayak competition, making it suitable to host local provincial level races.

KCKC has established itself as a high-profile, successful, and sustainable program within the Kamloops sporting community. With the support of multiple partners: Pacific Sport, Thompson Rivers University (TRU), Kamloops Immigrant Society, Tkemlúps te Secwépemc and others KCKC has successfully completed a number of programs in 2025.

The Club continues to experience significant growth across all programming areas, particularly in the Masters and Train-to-Train (T2T) programs. Safety for the water programs is of utmost importance. The \$17,000 grant supported

the purchase of a Wintech Wakeless safety boat.

KAMLOOPS COLLEGIATE BASEBALL SOCIETY (TRU WOLFPACK)

The Wolfpack batting cage/training facility was out of commission for a few years, and we were able to negotiate access to a facility on McArthur Island. The recent purchase of a metal cage (the skeleton/frame to hold it together) enabled us to repurpose some of the original cage components/materials. TRU granted the team access to the old gym, the cage was assembled in early January, and we were able to schedule regular, on campus training sessions. The team had been practicing outside.

The set-up in the old gym during the off-season proved to be invaluable in terms of efficiency (e.g., travel time & costs for over thirty players and coaches), limited impact on player class attendance, and

improving skill development. The cage is now being stored at TRU and can be assembled next year in a timely manner.

Due to wear and tear, the remaining part of the \$3,448 grant was directed towards replacing pants and jerseys.

KAMLOOPS MINOR HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

Kamloops Minor Hockey Association (KMHA) is one of the largest minor sport organizations in the Thompson–Nicola region, serving athletes from U5 through U18 across recreational, representative, and female hockey programs. KMHA's mandate is to provide safe, inclusive, and developmentally appropriate hockey experiences that support long-term athlete development, coach education, and community engagement.

The community impact of the \$11,500 in funding is demonstrated through improved coach education, enhanced athlete development, and increased access to quality programming for local youth. By supporting Hockey Canada-mandated coaching certification, KMHA has ensured that athletes across all divisions are led by trained coaches who are equipped to deliver safe, structured, and age-appropriate programming. This contributes to positive sport experiences, improved player retention, and a stronger culture of respect, safety, and development within the minor hockey system.

The investment in coaching education also supports the broader sport community by strengthening volunteer capacity. Reducing the financial burden associated with required certification

encourages greater participation and retention of qualified volunteer coaches, which in turn supports program stability and long-term sustainability.

The continued growth of Spring Hockey has expanded development opportunities for athletes seeking additional skill development outside the traditional season. This programming supports players at various stages of development, including those looking to improve skills, remain engaged in the sport year-round, or prepare for higher levels of competition.

As Spring Hockey participation has increased over multiple years, KMHA has been able to provide structured, accessible off-season programming that meets the evolving needs of the community.

KAMLOOPS SPORTS COUNCIL

The \$12,693 investment exemplifies the mandate of the Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund. Rather than supporting a single, one-time initiative, the funding enabled KSC to acquire critical shared assets that are used repeatedly across events, organizations, and seasons maximizing value, reducing duplication of costs, and strengthening collaboration across the local sport ecosystem.

A cornerstone of the funding impact was the purchase of an ice machine for the Kamloops Sports Council office.

While modest in appearance, this asset has proven to be one of the most frequently used and widely shared resources within KSC's operational environment.

The ice machine supports multiple sport organizations that rely on the use of the McArthur Island fields and the KSC building or collaborate with KSC on events. It is used to meet ice therapy needs for athletes, officials, volunteers, and staff

KAMLOOPS TENNIS ASSOCIATION

The Kamloops Tennis Association thanks the Sports Legacy Fund for the grant of \$4,174 which enabled us to purchase a new racquet stringing machine.

The stringer is located on-site in the clubhouse.

This investment has been a welcome addition in meeting the needs of the members and guests, allowing racquets to be strung on-site in a timely manner.

Modern players, especially high-performance juniors or graduates of such programs, with a style of play that emphasizes various spins associated with modern tennis shots, require racquet restringing more frequently than in the past. The stringer is equipped with the latest

during training sessions. In addition, the machine is utilized by St. John Ambulance when operating from or alongside KSC-supported events, ensuring first responders have immediate access to ice for injury treatment and participant care.

Another significant use of the 2025 Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund was the purchase of soccer balls and corner flags for the 2025 Canada Soccer U-17 National Championships hosted in Kamloops.

Hosting a national championship requires equipment that meets strict technical and competition standards, and the Legacy Fund support ensured that Kamloops could deliver a professional grade event that met or exceeded national expectations.

These resources directly supported athletes, officials, and teams from across Canada, contributing to a high-quality competitive environment and reinforcing Kamloops' reputation as capable and welcoming.

KAMLOOPS SUNRAYS ARTISTIC SWIMMING

The club was grateful to receive the \$2,232 grant funds to purchase hand paddles, toe bands, support scull training devices, and underwater headsets.

The headsets were used to help coaches communicate with athletes during warm-ups at competitions where the environment is loud and many other coaches are trying to coach their athletes as well. These provide the athletes that last minute advice they need to be successful at competitions.

With the grant we were also able to purchase two portable speakers that we can use at practice and competitions when doing land drill of our routines and land training to increase strength and flexibility.

technology, allowing young junior players to string their own racquets.

The stringer is an essential piece of equipment during many of the tournaments held at the tennis centre. During a junior tournament as many as 50-60 racquets may be strung throughout 5 days of competition.

The art of stringing a tennis racquet is one more skill set the junior players then acquire during their path to competitive tennis. Having such an up-to-date tennis accessory has allowed the Tennis Centre to maintain our standing as the premier tennis facility in the BC Interior. The tennis stringer is a valuable supplement to the year-round tennis opportunity we offer.

KAMLOOPS THERAPEUTIC RIDING ASSOCIATION

In 2025, our organization received \$5,000 from the Kamloops Sports Legacy

Fund toward the installation of new lighting and fans in our indoor arena.

This grant was used exclusively for the purchase and installation of:

- High-efficiency LED lights to replace outdated, uneven lighting.
- Industrial-grade ceiling fans to improve air circulation and comfort for athletes, volunteers, and spectators.

The grant has proven to be a strategically impactful investment. Not only did it enhance the immediate usability and comfort of our indoor arena, but it also strengthened our long-term capacity to expand programming, reduce costs, and better serve the community.

KAMLOOPS TRACK AND FIELD CLUB

We are very thankful for the \$14,578 grant to invest in our club's future with equipment and coaching and because of having equipment in various events (track



and field has 22+ events in our sport) we are considered one of the best equipped clubs in the country.

By having equipment for training and for competition we are able to be sustainable financially through offering events at competitions.

Our goal is to work towards keeping this current and in good working order. This equipment is not only to host meets but to provide athletes with proper equipment for training for which we charge membership.

This helps athletes in the schools (elementary and high school) not only in Kamloops but the surrounding areas as well. We are able to host clinics and camps as well giving athletes an opportunity in summer to partake in camps. This investment provides a future for the youth in sport.

KAMLOOPS TRIATHLON CLUB

The Kamloops Triathlon Club (KTC) gratefully acknowledges the \$12,750 investment from the Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund for the 2025 application year. This funding directly supported two key priorities outlined in our application: the acquisition of an enclosed storage and travel trailer and the development of community coaches.

Together, these investments have strengthened our capacity to deliver inclusive, year-round programming and high-quality events for athletes of all ages and abilities.

The new enclosed trailer has significantly improved operational efficiency by providing secure, centralized storage and reliable transportation for event equipment.

It has eliminated the need for costly rentals and temporary storage while improving our ability to host local and

regional events. This asset supports the long-term growth of triathlon in Kamloops and aligns with our goal of maximizing local infrastructure to deliver accessible, high-quality sport experiences.



Funding enabled the training of four community coaches, including participation in Triathlon BC-supported education and Race Director workshops. This investment has strengthened coaching capacity, improved program quality, and expanded structured training opportunities for youth and adult athletes.

As a result, KTC has grown its twice-weekly swim sessions and introduced consistent indoor spin training using previously acquired smart trainers.

A key outcome of this funding is the Kamloops Indoor Triathlon at the Tournament Capital Centre.

The event reflects the intent of the original grant by maximizing indoor facilities, expanding participation, and reducing weather-related barriers. Over sixty participants will compete in sprint and super sprint formats.

KAMLOOPS TSUNAMI SUMMER SWIM CLUB

Thank you again for the \$2,000 grant that we received for our 2025 season! With the funds that we received we were able to purchase swim caps and fifty team t-shirts to showcase our athletes at our swim meets. Items such as these are essential for us to continue our prominent level of training and coaching for our competitive summer swim team right here in Kamloops.

This essential equipment enables Tsunami to remain competitive within the Okanagan Region in many meets throughout the season as well as within our province at the British Columbia Summer Swimming Association (BCSSA) Provincial Championships in which we



were able to send many swimmers this 2025 season to Vancouver at UBC!

KAMLOOPS ULTIMATE LEAGUE SOCIETY

Ultimate is a seven-on-seven field sport, also called frisbee football. Athletes cut to get open for a pass then are stationary looking up field for the next possible pass to make.

Catching in the other team's end zone is scored as a point. Games are played to thirteen points or to a designated length of time.

The sport is non-contact but can involve jumping, some boxing out behaviours and diving catches as well. We play co-ed in Kamloops Secondary schools, and our U18 Junior program is gendered.

Our sport is also self-officiated meaning no referees, so players learn social skills, the art of disagreement and mutual respect: The grant of \$1,947 was used to purchase 120 discs.

KAMLOOPS WATERSKI CLUB

The Kamloops Waterski Club (KWSC) extends its sincere gratitude to the Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund for its generous \$11,942 grant, which enabled the implementation of a World Ranking List capable tournament judging technology system.

This system has transformed KWSC's ability to host high-caliber events and meet international judging standards.

Thanks to this infrastructure, KWSC successfully hosted a Waterski Ranking List (WRL) tournament on July 6–8. The technology performed exceptionally well, enabling judging that met and exceeded international standards. Experienced international officials were brought in to

ensure event credibility and remarked that the video and judging setup was among the best they had ever seen.

KAMLOOPS YOUTH SOCCER ASSOCIATION (KAMLOOPS UNITED FC)

KYSA rebranded as the KUFC undertook the major restoration of the Soccer Dome in the summer and fall of 2024.

The upgrade was supported by a 5-year interest free loan from the City of Kamloops and a \$120,000 commitment from the Fund to invest \$40,000 per year through 2026.

The restoration has provided the association the opportunity to operate to capacity during the winter months, and alternate options during heat spells and smoky conditions the rest of the year. The 20-year-old facility was becoming unusable, and Kamloops and region currently lacks an indoor site for training and multiuse activities.

This investment has a significant impact on the sporting community and will complement future field house development envisioned within the Build Kamloops project. The project funding was sourced from the Capital Project Reserve Fund and was year two of the three-year grant.

KIDSPORT KAMLOOPS CHAPTER

KidSport Kamloops is a local chapter of KidSport Canada. They are a not-for-profit organization that works to remove the financial barriers that otherwise prohibit a child from playing sports.

Funds raised locally are spent locally and are distributed as grants to cover registration and/or equipment fees associated with participation in a season of

sport. Sport and physical activity provide invaluable opportunities for kids to learn teamwork, fair play, and dedication.

Through sport participation, kids learn how to set goals and work to achieve them — all while having fun and learning social and fundamental movement skills. Kids in sport benefit from increases in self-confidence and tend to lead happier, healthier lifestyles, now and in the future.

The chapter accepts applications and administers grants of up to \$625 per child/year, for kids who live in Kamloops, or in one of the other communities they serve. The year 2025 was most successful, with 395 kids receiving \$165,000 in support.

The downside of this outcome is a significant demand for the fund-raising capacity of the local group. The grant of

PACIFICSPORT INTERIOR BC

PacificSport Interior BC is a Regional Sport Centre that educates, inspires, and engages communities in the sport pathway. The not-for-profit Society is connected to a network of five PacificSport Centres and three National campuses (Canadian Sport Institute) and the Regional Alliance across the province.

The PacificSport Centres are a network of not-for-profit organizations committed to enriching lives and energizing communities via sport, physical activity, and physical literacy across BC.

As we mark the closing of the 2026 Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina, we are reminded of the profound collective

impact our community has in supporting athletes and coaches along their high-performance journey.

The enduring partnership between the Kamloops Sports Legacy Society and PacificSport Interior BC has been instrumental in fueling the passion and ambition of those striving to reach the next level in sport.

Together, we have built a model of support that strengthens not only performance, but the foundation of sport in our region.

Through Coaching Development grants — matched by local clubs to build capacity — we have elevated our sport organizations and reinforced a belief that guides our work: without coaches, there is no sport.

Coaches are at the heart of athlete development. They shape skill, character, leadership, and resilience. Thanks to this funding, fifteen salaried coaches are supported annually. Importantly, PacificSport Interior BC continues to provide administrative oversight and

deliver on all sport commitments without charging fees to the Kamloops Legacy Fund, ensuring that every dollar goes directly toward impact.

Additional funding for athlete travel and coach support provides a critical “step-up” opportunity — enabling athletes to compete at National Championships and coaches to pursue professional development. With the rising costs of travel, this financial assistance eases the burden on families and ensures that opportunity is not limited by circumstance.

To date, more than \$350,000 has supported 846 athletes attending National Championships, and over \$82,000 has assisted 168 coaches.

These investments are building champions today while shaping leaders for tomorrow.

The Kamloops Spawts Legacy Fund continues to be a powerful and consistent force for sport in our region. AsCarolynn Boomer, Executive Director of PacificSport Interior BC, often says, “It takes a community to build a champion.” This partnership exemplifies that belief. The Legacy Fund is truly a gem within our community — and its impact is nothing short of transformational.

Thank you for your continued leadership and commitment. What we have built together is admired across British Columbia, and its influence will be felt for generations to come.

Sun Peaks Freestyle Club (SPFC) received \$2,182 to purchase critical equipment for the launch of our new Snowboard Cross (SBX) Team Program. This expansion represents a major milestone in the continued evolution of freestyle sport at Sun Peaks, supporting athlete development for snowboarders and skiers ages 8+ across the region. With the generous contribution from the Kamloops Sports Legacy Fund, SPFC successfully purchased 30 FIS-approved World Cup Supply SBX/SX Gates and a complete Demon United Wax & Tune Kit with roto brushes. These items were essential for building a safe, high-quality training environment for our inaugural SBX program and for advancing athlete performance across all snowboard disciplines.

We are thrilled—and deeply grateful—for the \$3,700 in funding support that enabled us to purchase our new SPRTA cargo trailer. This trailer now serves as a secure, on-site home for our trail-building and maintenance tools, significantly improving our efficiency and the quality of the work we can complete on our community trail network. T.R.I.P.S. has been successful in continuing to develop our recreational paddling opportunities primarily out of our compound at the Pioneer Park boat launch.

As in past years we have also hosted day trips, courses, and clinics on other local waterways (Paul Lake, Shuswap River,). The grant of \$7,760 for two new canoes (Clipper Brewer tandem and Hellman Solitude solo) have been useful and welcome additions to our fleet and used on many occasions, particularly in club paddling sessions out of Pioneer Park for rec programs and marathon training sessions.

The other equipment such as throw ropes, were used in many of the programs we run and helped to modernize and improve our risk management practices

As noted, the Brewer and especially the solitude solo were especially useful and appreciated additions which our leaders and participants enjoyed for club paddling sessions.

These Wednesday and Thursday night sessions out of Pioneer Park are the backbone of our club activities and the new solo especially gave us more flexibility in terms of what leaders could paddle to help effectively lead sessions with odd numbers of participants. The Hellman Solitude solo is stable and fast making it an excellent boat to lead and potentially perform rescues in. The Brewer was well enjoyed as well especially by our Marathon members.

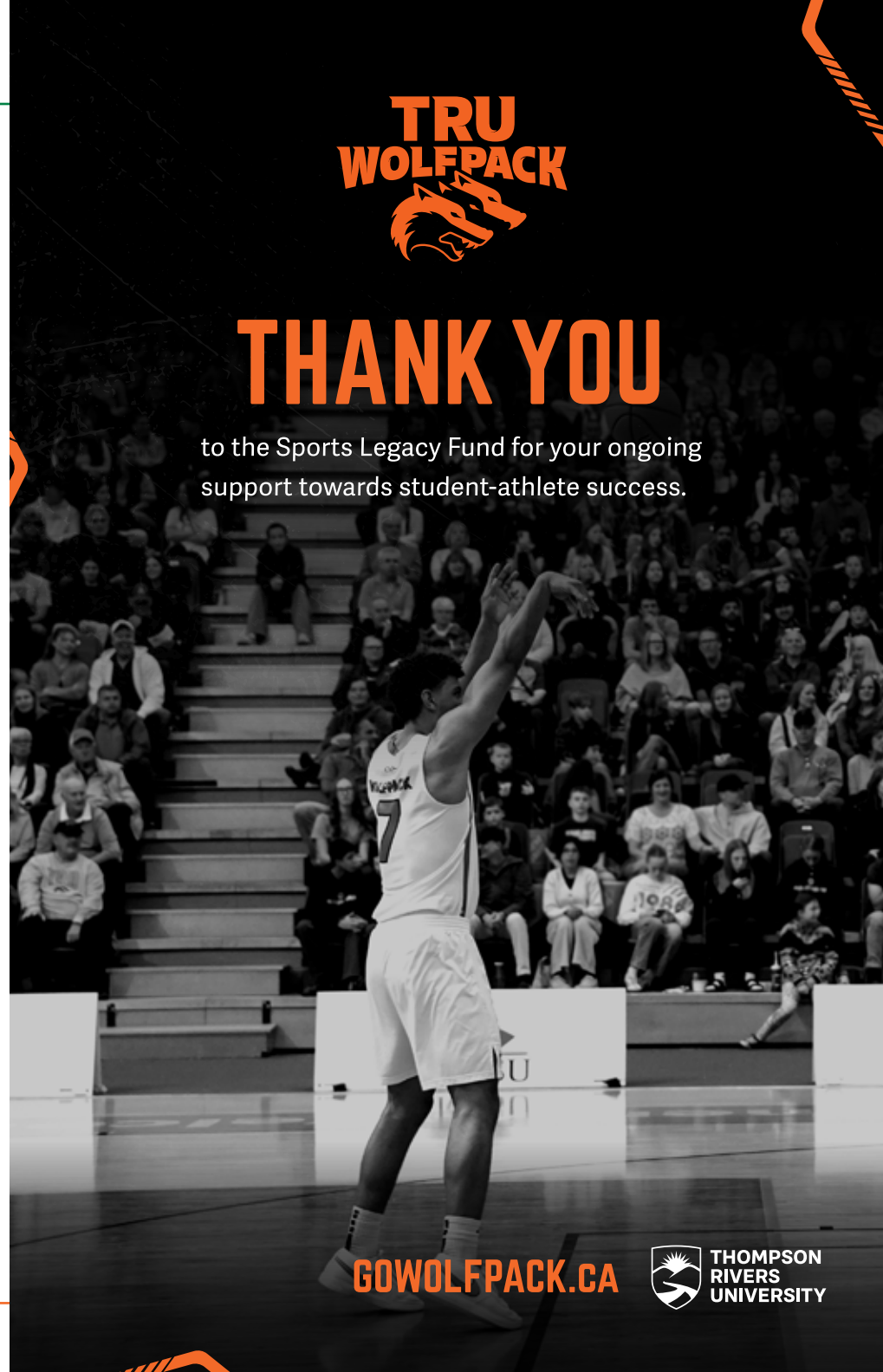
